fragmentation directionlessness and a lack of uniformity have created a crisis in social studies education to understand how social studies reached this point and analyze where it needs to go it is useful to consider the evolution of the discipline in relation to significant social and intellectual periods in american history social studies curricula began to emphasize citizenship training as a response to the population shifts and immigration of the post civil war era the growth of professional social studies organizations and increased standardization of the curriculum were a reflection of the social reforms of the 1800 s through the 1930 s during these years educational leaders proposed a variety of approaches to social studies teaching including the civic centered

approach the social problems approach and the individualized approach a new social studies emerged in the late 1950s as a byproduct of the cold war characterized by an anything goes attitude it spawned creative innovations but also divided method content and ideology in the field this lack of definition has reached a critical point with the current back to basics movement the development of a nationalized framework of instruction is essential to correct the present situation the necessary nationwide revisions in social studies curriculum scope and sequence require cooperation from all levels of the profession
